It is an interesting, enlightening experience--and fun as well! It is well worth getting up early and heading South on I-95! 

Arlington Mill Lunch Bunch

The Arlington Mill High School Lunch Bunch will meet on February 19, from 12:40-1:20 in the Library at the Career Center, 816 S. Walter Reed Drive, Arlington. The students will continue their video-based *Girl Rising* journey, this month to Peru, to meet Senna who shares her story and struggle to survive in a bleak Peruvian mining town. Through her father's insistence that she go to school, she discovers the transformative power of poetry. Senna says, "Poetry is how I turn fear into will."

Girl Rising is both a film and a grassroots movement that highlights the critical need to educate girls in order to break the cycle of poverty and related issues including gender-based violence, discrimination, forced labor and human trafficking. Discussion and interactive activities are included to enhance and support the storytelling format of the film.

STEM Update

Arlington AAUW has been offered the opportunity to join with Alexandria AAUW and, hopefully, another branch in Northern Virginia to plan and implement an all-day *Tech Savvy Conference* for 6-9th grade girls. *Tech Savvy* is a day-long STEM Career Conference designed to attract young women to the fields and is sponsored by National AAUW. In this case, BAE Systems, an international defense system company, on the same order as Northrop-Grumann and Lockheed-Martin, is fully funding this conference for \$30,000. The conference will occur mid-October-mid-November, 2015. One interesting fact - we will not have to collect fees for the conference as that will be taken care of online. Our Executive Committee agreed to support this endeavor. We have to have four branch members to participate in the planning. I have agreed to chair our four-person group. Another member has already agreed to be one of the other three members. Our tasks will be identical, of sorts, to our other three STEM Conferences except that we will be working at with at least one other branch. The fact that it is fully-funded and that we will not have to go through what we've been through collecting fees makes my heart sing. I am all in. Who amongst you will agree to be the other two branch members who plan this event?

LOBBY CORPS AND THE 113TH CONGRESS

Lobby Corps, the volunteer arm of AAUW's Action Fund just completed its January training and lunch. Here are some of Lobby Corps' amazing accomplishments in the 113th Congress.

- Lobby Corps made 1,150 visits on 17 different bills. AAUW received feedback from 85% of the office visited. These offices included all 50 states, District of Columbia and 4 territories. There was at least 1 visit to 72% of the Representatives, and 100% of the Senators received a visit.
- Some of the corps' successes include: passage of the National Women's History Museum Act, an Executive Order regarding Fair Pay, Paycheck Fairness Act gained 6 more cosponsors and the Workforce Investment Act was reauthorized.

Lisa Maatz, Vice President for Government Relations, talked to us about the issue focus for the coming year. Ahead of us is the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. One of the buzzwords to watch for is portability for Title I students, pushing for the student to take the funds with the student when the student moves to another school, similar to a voucher. Social Security is affected by recent House rules not allowing for the different form of SS funds to be kept separate. Fair Pay Bill may now be tailored to reflect the New Hampshire and Minnesota Bills. Also, support of the process of Executive Orders is on the table.



AAUW staff member, Pam Yuen will be facilitating the Lobby Corps. Pam will be providing us briefing on Thursday mornings.

Yes, it was a busy year and this year will be the Lobby Corps' 40th Anniversary and another busy year. Representing the Arlington Branch were Sara Anderson, Karen Bopp, Marcy Leverenz and Betsy Marron.

A note from Opera Nova

So often I have heard seniors say---Oh they never do anything for us---they only know we are alive when an election is coming up, they do everything for children and schools...



For years Opera Nova has been trying to get seniors to attend the 10 am school-day productions of the annual children's opera with modest success. Then about five years or so ago, I met Tom Fonseca, who with others established *The Fenwick Foundation* focusing on getting residential seniors out of nursing homes and learning a little about them and their challenges. Foundation took them first to a National's baseball game providing van transportation, a ticket and \$10 to cover refreshments at the game. WOW! I thought we want to do that and by the performance on November 22, 2014 of *Magic Flute*—Fenwick Foundation arranged for 51 residential seniors from five different Nursing Homes in the area to attend. Eleven of the 51 seniors were in wheel chairs, some on walkers, but they did like the live theater production of *Magic Flute*. *Così fan tutte* is scheduled for the various dates in February by Arlington County Cultural Affairs, we will follow our pattern that we have for 40 years for children---condense the three hour opera to 75 minutes, develop a study guide, have English translations in the program and on overhead slides. We are considering having a narrator and we've asked Don Beyer to attend to welcome them---needless to say when we asked his schedule was not yet set---but we will get some political figure to welcome

SO WE ASK AAUW---will you join us in "honoring" seniors? Come attend if you are a senior!! Bring a senior! Send a donation which we can always use---buy five tickets and give them to seniors to facilitate their coming---maybe you have a Senior Outreach Committee.
