WOMEN'S MARCH ON WASHINGTON

January 2017 was important for many reasons in our country and January 21, 2017 was perhaps one of the most meaningful days for about 500,000 women (and men) who participated in the Women's March on Washington. What started as a reaction to



the November election results, grew to be an opportunity for hundreds of thousands of folks to stand for issues that impact our country including healthcare access, equal pay, climate and the environment, discrimination, racism, immigration, education opportunities and the people who make and enforce our laws.

It was a privilege to be among the many pink-hatted women who rallied and marched the day after the inauguration to be sure everyone's voice is heard. I was there with my two adult daughters and eight of their friends from Georgia but we saw and spoke with folks from around the country and met a group of women proudly wearing huge AAUW pins as we listened and cheered as Gloria Steinem, Sister Simone Campbell (founder of Nuns on the Bus), Cecile Richards from Planned Parenthood, Ashley Judd, Michael Moore and others called for the crowd to not just march that one day

but to take positive action to ensure these issues are addressed and our new leaders hear our voices.

There were many creative and unique signs held high by young girls with their moms, teenagers together with their BFFs, groups of middle-aged women who traveled from across the country and old folks like me with bad backs! There were lots of chants, songs and cheers and one that was repeated throughout the day was "This is what democracy looks like!"

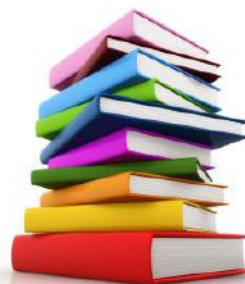
